### STOP PRESS.....

A sad announcement just came in from Jim Newman – a real Biggin Hill'ite, Mick Ronayne, who was 98 & a half sadly passed away this morning, 29<sup>th</sup> August.

A pleasant detail of Mick's background and passing contributed by Jim Newman....

"It's with great sadness that I report the peaceful passing of Mick (David) Ronayne on 29<sup>th</sup> August 2025 at the age of 98. Born in February 1927, Mick was brought up very close to the old Croydon airport, which inspired his love of aeroplanes.

Just as the war drew to a close, Mick joined the army and was trained as a Paratrooper. Initially thinking they were bound for the eastern theatre, the Japanese war ended, and instead the 2<sup>nd</sup> Paras went to Egypt and spent some time being shot at in Palestine.

One story he told me was that they were living in tents, but their Sergeant made them dig foxholes to sleep in. During the night a truck drove by and machine gunned all the tents!!

Leaving the army, he joined the police force and was stationed in Croydon for 14 years, although I suspect he wasn't the best disciplined of officers!

After leaving the force, Mick bought the first of his three Tiger Moths G-AOES (the red one) and started County Flying Club at Biggin, where many of us had the privilege of learning to fly.

He ended up with three Tigers: in addition to OES there was G-ANKB (the yellow one), which is no longer registered, and G-AOBO (the blue one), which now resides in France in the care of John Shaw.

Over the years at Biggin, a number of other clubs became affiliated or resided with the County F.C. including the Metropolitan Police Group and the Civil Service Flying Club.

Mick operated some interesting types from time to time, including the first of the Isaacs Fury 7/10th scale Hawker Furies, a Rollason Condor, a Kittywake, and even a Tipsy Nipper. There were plenty of adventures.

Eventually the cost of operating vintage biplanes commercially became too much, and Mick was forced to close the club.

He then joined the Police Air Wing based in Muscat, Oman, as a Major flying the Pilatus Porter and the Buffalo, where we were able to meet up for a beer or three.

After a few years in the desert, he returned to the UK, living in Ashford with his partner Lorna who sadly contracted dementia. Mick cared for her at home for some years up until a few days before the sad but inevitable end.

Mick lived at The Spires at St. Michaels, Tenterden, Kent for the past few years, and a highlight for him was a visit from a number of his old students from the club, including Chris Jesson and Adrian Obertelli, on his 97<sup>th</sup> birthday. It was quite moving for all of us.

### **BIGGIN HILL AIRPORT**

The extensive runway resurfacing project, which operates at night, and during weekdays, is progressing well and is expected to be completed towards the end of September. They basically resurface relatively small sections of the runway each night and then allows the airport to operate again during the normal opening hours each day.

Once the resurfacing is completed, then new runway lighting, including centreline lighting, and of course runway markings, will be done.

Once completed, the airport will continue to operate as an excellent facility to cover London and the Southeast commercial and executive flights operation for many years to come.

The airport appreciates your continued patience and understanding as they complete this essential project.

As discussed in the last Newsletter, Biggin Hill Airport now has the new automated METAR system that is operational when the airport is out of hours. Once the airport opens up each day, the standard METARs are provided by the operational ATC staff once they are back on duty. (Outside operational hours, the automated METAR generated information then enables the TAF to be generated overnight too.)

This new system is good for us users, but also definitely great for long distance inbound aircraft, that are due to arrive here quite early. So being aware of the current weather and also the anticipated forecast conditions that may be likely for their arrival is excellent for them.

The building of the very large new Bombardier respray hangar is progressing quite quickly, and according to the airport CEO's report is expected to actually be available for use towards the middle of 2026.

Our Airport's CEO, David Winstanley, will include his regular monthly section, which is present towards the end of this newsletter, to keep us fully up to date with any airport plans that may affect us.....

### SEPTEMBER BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT and the Jet A1 price also excludes</u> <u>the Sustainable Aviation Fuel Levy</u>, for the calendar month of September 2025 are:

£1:68.90 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre – and an additional 1p per litre off if also paid by Direct Debit)

£0:80.30 per litre for Jet A1

(As we explained for a couple of months, the government has mandated that all JetA1 fuel be sold with a 2% blend of Sustainable Aviation Fuel. This mandate, which is applicable to all UK airports, is intended to secure and grow UK SAF demand, support the growth of the SAF industry, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions of aviation fuels in the UK.

Due to the additional cost of introducing more expensive SAF into JetA1 fuel, as dictated by this compulsory government initiative, the airport has introduced the SAF levy on JetA1 sales since the beginning of this year. To aid clarity and transparency, they have included this to be displayed as a separate line on the invoices.)

**SPECIAL NOTES:** Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

### MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

August has matched July in terms of landing volume, fuel uplifts and revenue, which continues the very positive trend this financial year. Again, given the current global tension around Ukraine, Gaza, Iran and UK economic pressures, the Airport continues to demonstrate its resilience and adaptability.

The Bombardier Paint facility is progressing well with the side elevations, cladding and roof all complete along with 80% of the concrete apron and its drainage. The main car park is largely complete and the internal ductwork installation has started. The Mega-doors are on site ready to be installed early next month. The project remains on time and the facility is due for completion in August 2026.

The runway resurfacing project is progressing well with over 900m of grooved new runway in place and a further circa 350m of engrooved binder and surface course laid. The ducting works for the new lighting is keeping pace with the resurfacing and the overall project remains on track for completion by the end of October. Additionally, the Airport will be adding lead off/lead on lights at the 03 threshold and will carry out some limited taxiway resurfacing. To keep fully up to date on these projects, please keep an eye on our social media channels: Facebook, LinkedIn and Instagram.

The Landing Hotel continues to perform well and, across all operational areas, continues to exceed expectations. Feedback remains very positive, which reflects the popularity of the hotel and its importance to the Airport. The new Autumn menu has now been launched and the hotel is already taking bookings for Christmas! The Hotel continues to enjoy periods of full occupancy.

As previously mentioned, the Airport remains on track to achieve carbon neutral status by 2029 and we continue to build on the success of achieving our Carbon Reduction Level 2 Accreditation with the Airport Carbon Accreditation. Our newly formed Environmental Oversight Committee goes from strength to strength, and the Airport is now looking at a concept to generate hydrogen on demand for protentional heating solutions.

On Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> September the Airport is planning to conduct the first live flight trial of the 03 PBN RNAV radius to fix approach in a home-based Lear 75. If the live flight trial goes well then, a validation report will be submitted to the CAA as part of the phased implementation plan for the full trail later this year. This will mark a significant milestone in the introduction of an IFR approach to runway 03 and towards making the Airport all weather capable. The Airport is targeting a commence date for the trial in FYQ3 this year.

The Airport remains pleased with the engagement with the Private Pilots Group (PPG). The Airport is delighted that membership is flourishing and that engagement remains positive. This further demonstrates the Airport's continued commitment to the GA community.

The Airport Residents Noise Action Forum (ARNAF) continues to make good progress towards making enhancements to the Airport's complaints process, and propose KPIs for the handling of complaints. There will be PPG representation with the ARNAF working groups and much of this positive work will be captured within the next review of the Noise Abatement Plan.
