Soon to be supported by a proposed railway system from London, enabling people to come to these vast open spaces and fresh air. A railway station was proposed as far back as 1903 and would have been near the Fox and Hounds Pub. It's probably just as well the railway didn't come to Biggin Hilll as it would have changed the whole culture of our society, totally. WORLDS LONELIEST ISLAND Following an in depth conversation whilst pouring a couple of cold Lagers down the old gullet, the Pitcairn Islands were mentioned. These islands were the result of the 'Mutiny on the Bounty' a ship which landed there on 15^{th} January 1790 in the command of Fletcher Christian. REX NICHOLLS EFG CLUB



Rex Nicholls, who celebrated his 80th Birthday at the Pilots Pals.on the 24th March. This was a preplanned surprise party of which he was totally unaware, until he was ushered in the door. Rex came to Biggin Hill in September 1959 flying a Miles Magister from Croydon Airport, which was closed from this time on. Rex was one of your 'Top of the Tree' Instructors Examiner for and 50 years amassing 16,000 hours. Rex also competed in the Kings Cup Air Race Team in 1966, flying Surrey and Kent Chipmunks. The race was won by his team mate John Miles of 600 Squadron Flying Rex has many amusing Club. stories about flying up his sleeve about the old days at Croydon, and of the early car races around Biggin Hill.

This fantastic event was initiated by his lovely wife Janet as she was at

her wits end to arrange a suitable surprise. We at Pilots Pals had the answer and the facility to provide the venue. Older they were, (the people that attended) but not one looked any older, from when the editor last saw them. There were no less than 80 genuine friends, many pilots from the old days, to pay tribute to Rex's many years at Pictured above are Biggin Hill. some these people. It was a tumultuous event fraught with some devious deception by his wife Janet and the rest of his family, keeping the event in total secrecy. Rex was well respected as one of the best instructors around - 'Top of the Tree' quality. Rex was more than surprised on his arrival at the club on Saturday afternoon. All he could see was the editor sitting on a stool at the bar - then everyone sang 'Happy Birthday'. It only dawned on him when he was greeted by his wife, just inside the door that



something strange had been going on around him for the past weeks, like his mail being opened and his clothes vanishing. We at the Pilots pals would like to express our thanks to everyone for turning up on time. This was the crux of the event, just to see the expression on Rex's face as he entered the bar!
