## DEREK ARCHER

It is with sadness that I have to advise of the loss of another old Biggin Hill'ite, Derek Archer.

Derek passed away after a short illness on the 11<sup>th</sup> July 2015 aged eighty four. He leaves wife of 59 years, Brenda, and their two children, Allison and Jane, as well as his seven grandchildren.

Derek will be known to many old Biggin Hill'ites as he learnt to fly on Austers at Air Touring Club in the late 1960's when they were located in their "Pillbox" clubhouse over on the West side of the airfield. He flew very regularly and was actually in the bar when a group of members decided to club together to buy Bolkow Monson, G AYPE, in 1974. He joined them as a founder member of what became the "Papa Echo Group" that still operates at Biggin to this day. He remained a member of the group until 2007, when he sold his share to Gary Merchant.

A printer by trade, having started D. Archer and Company Print Finishers in 1963, he also formed Westarch Productions with fellow Biggin Hill'ite Peter Westacott as a sideline to print Peter's well known paintings. These include the Anniversary painting showing the Concorde flypast with two Spitfires at the Biggin Hill Air Fair.

Derek was a hard worker who was still actively working and managing his printing business until just two weeks before his death.

His funeral was held at the Beckenham Crematorium on the 22<sup>nd</sup> July. The family would like to thank the current members of the Papa Echo Group who very kindly put up the Derek's former aircraft on the day of the funeral to enable it to perform a flypast of his home as the funeral party left there. Derek's widow and the family were hugely touched. A most fitting tribute for a man who just loved to fly.

He will be missed by his many friends and colleagues. R.I.P. Derek.

## BOB LEE

Bob Lee, formerly a member of 600 Sqd Flying Group in the 1960's passed away after suffering from a serious illness for some months.
