THE AIRPORT

The CAA has published some of the airspace proposals for the temporary restricted and/or controlled airspace during the 2012 Olympics period – these can be seen at:

At first glance there seems to be little to affect us at Biggin – BUT – they have yet to publish anything for the immediate area around Biggin Hill, so I fear the shocks are yet to come....

Whilst on the subject of the Olympics, Bromley Council are shortly to be reviewing the responses to Biggin Hill Airport's proposals for that same period for variations in the airport lease (for details of the Airport's proposals see www.bigginhillclub.co.uk/bh_olympic_proposals.pdf).

Whilst I feel the Airport Management, by its handling of the premature termination of the Air fair contract, have really not endeared itself to many of us (as airport users and residents alike), I am nevertheless appalled at the misinformation and propaganda being distributed by the normal airport opposition groups in the area around the airport. Interestingly, this new "Association" appears to claim it is a coalition of – amongst others – Residents Associations. It does NOT appear to represent the Biggin Hill & District Residents Association (of which I am a member), who have come out with guarded support for the Airport's plans for the Olympics. If they are allowed to grow in strength, they can only damage the airport that we operate from, and none of us would want really want that...

So – can I ask all of you that either live nearby, work at, or fly from, Biggin Hill Airport, to quickly put pen to paper to let the Bromley Council know that not everyone wants to stop the airport operating. We all know it is important that the airport makes the most of the commercial opportunity offered by the Olympics coming to London. We only ask that the management, in return, recognise the support and do everything they can to allow Biggin Hill based clubs, businesses, and privately owned based aircraft, to operate through that period with minimal restrictions placed upon them. You don't even have to write a letter, it can be done by email – but it is important that we do all do it..

Time to put away our personal grievances with the management and show our support for once... After all, a strong and financially secure airport will ensure Biggin Hill survives as an airport into the future for all our benefits!

Residents and other interested groups can express their views about the BHAL plans in an eight week consultation period. The slightly extended consultation period now closes on Friday 18 February 2011 at 17.00 hours.
