#### ALOUETTE FLYING CLUB

As you will see when you read the section below provided by Stuart Taylor, the Chairman of the club, Alouette (which was actually started in 1959 by Don Perch!) will be ceasing operations at the end of February.

There have been lots of rumours and misinformation spreading on Social Media, so along with Stuart, I just wish to correct some of the incorrect information that has been circulated by many who do not know the facts...

The Club has NOT been thrown out of the Airport by the airport management!

The Club has NOT gone bust!

The Club has NOT run out of money!

The Airport Management have always been very helpful and done their best to help the club, and they should not be unnecessarily criticised as has been spread by some unconnected people!

The facts are that with the UK's very uncertain economic climate, membership has reduced quite dramatically (some flying members are being quite rightly told by their families to conserve their family finances to ensure that they can continue to feed their children and other dependents, and to ensure they can continue to heat their homes in these difficult times!)

From the Club's point of view, they felt it unethical to continue to take up front payments for such things as Trial Lessons and five-hour packs, when we felt the club should cease operations.

The decision to cease was made to ensure that we maintain the cash reserves to enable such previous purchases to either be flown before the close date, or the unused payments returned to the purchasers.

Obviously the Club is sad to find it necessary to cease operations after all these years, but feel that they are doing the right thing to protect it's members and others involved in the operation. I personally believe they are doing the right thing in these difficult times and should be supported for acting in such a professional manner.

Obviously though, the club would welcome anyone involved with the airport, and all present and past members to the final social gathering at the club bar on 18<sup>th</sup> February from 15:00 – I and they would love to see everyone to join us to say goodbye to virtually the oldest ever club at Biggin Hill Airport.

# **AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT PROGRESS**

The various Airport developments/improvements are still progressing very well.....

The "Landings Hotel" is now expected to be completed in around mid-February, and it is expected to have a couple of "soft" openings in late February and early March, and then the formal public opening will follow shortly after.

Taxiway "Bravo" joining the "Foxtrot" taxiway to the current "Alpha" and "Charlie" taxiway is now well underway. This new taxiway will then enable the airport's much larger corporate jets to taxi safely to Runway 21, without having to use the current, much narrower, "Alpha" taxiway. But the "Alpha" taxiway itself has now also been resurfaced.

The airport is much improved now with all the building smartening up and the perimeter road resurfacing right from the entrance through to the Heritage Hangar on the far side has made it all so much better. (The airport has asked us all to adhere to the roadway speed limits so that adding speed bumps can be avoided.)

With Biggin Hill Airport now looking very much like a mini-Heathrow, which is something that we all should be proud of. The restructuring has ensured that the wonderful ex-Battle of Britain airfield is likely to always remain operational for the specialised Executive Jet movements that serve our capital city.

In spite of these improvements and changes, General Aviation aircraft are still likely to retain a home here, but I know all GA Light Aircraft operators are very concerned about the high charging structure that applies to their operations, and which make their ongoing flying more difficult to maintain the flow of revenue generating flying. All we can all do is to continue to show the airport how seriously we all take the special routings, and Noise Abatement procedures etc. (In reality, the airport does frequently congratulate all the GA Biggin based operators on the way they work so well within the rules applied to us all. It is important that based operators continue to do this and make it obvious that the real infringers are visiting non-based GA traffic – not those that are based at the airport!)

### FEBRUARY BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of February 2023 are:

£1:91.2 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card</u> Only from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

£0:98.3 per litre for Jet A1 (or £1:55.5 per litre for "Sustainable Aviation Fuel"!)

<u>SPECIAL NOTES:</u> Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

# **ALOUETTE FLYING CLUB**

It has been a surprisingly emotional month here at Alouette. After announcing our forthcoming closure at the end of February I have received many lovely messages from old members and old Biggin Hill'ites to whom Alouette meant an awful lot. The stories were very much of their time - tall tales of derring do, things that would send shockwaves through today's hi-viz culture - but the sentiment is inescapable; Alouette has meant an awful lot, to an awful lot of people.

Such is the scope of Alouette's existence that the club had been in operation for five years before my mother was even born. Put into a human scale it is a breathtaking achievement that Alouette has survived this long. What saddened me most in reading these messages from previous members is that I have missed the heyday not only of Alouette but of aviation in this country. Born in the wrong era, me thinks.

I would also just like to address some of the rumours that have inevitably surfaced after our closure announcement. Firstly, Alouette has not gone bust. We have seen a significant decrease both in membership, member involvement and sheer flying revenue since surviving the pandemic. We can all pontificate on the reasons for that in our own time, but the club categorically has not run out of money. We have taken this decision now precisely because we have not yet run out of money, and we can shutdown in the right and proper manner.

Secondly, we have not been asked to leave by the Biggin Hill airport management. It is no secret that there are operational difficulties in attracting students to Biggin Hill. The landing fees are high, we have to go elsewhere for circuits which adds a significant cost, and even the tedious, time-consuming and actually rather costly process, instigated by the DfT, of obtaining a security pass are all headaches for based pilots and are all reasons we have seen students leave. None of that really is a surprise. But I want to make it absolutely crystal clear that the decision to close Alouette was made by Alouette, not by the airport. We have long maintained a good rapport with the management and they have been exceptionally helpful throughout the last few years.

Finally I would like to extend an invite to you all for the closing party taking place in the Alouette

clubhouse on Saturday February 18th, kicking off officially at 1500. We have an awful lot of bar stock to get through so I will likely be there from around lunchtime. Please do come along and help us in bidding farewell to an institution of life at Biggin Hill for the past 64 years.

Hope to see you there. Until next month.......

### MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

A very belated Happy New Year to everyone!

January has been a challenging month for the Airport that has seen traffic levels slightly down on 2022 but still well above pre pandemic levels. The Airport remains busy and this bodes well for a solid performance throughout the last quarter of this financial year. The financial environment remains challenging and the cost of doing business has increased for everyone, something the Airport is very conscious of as it reviews the fees and charges for 2023/24. The Airport is currently focused on preparing its budget for 23/24 and the critical challenge is the need to balance control of costs against continued investment in infrastructure.

In terms of development, the Hotel is fast approaching the final stages of construction with soft openings planned for late February and early March. Formal PC should be achieved early February and the Hotel teams are already working on familiarising themselves with the layout and operating procedures.

The Airport has completed the road and footpath resurfacing on Churchill Way from the roundabout to Wireless Way, leaving the area for the new Gatehouse and the cul-de-sac to Hangar 170, the only outstanding works to complete the overall project.

The Airport continues to engage with Mr Ecclestone regarding options for the development of West Camp. This remains an important strategic objective but will require detailed engagement with Heritage England and the LBB.

The Airport continues to see a strong demand for additional hangars and is meeting this demand through emerging contractual discussions. Clearly, such developments will go through the appropriate planning processes. The Airport has completed the works to re surface taxiway Alpha and construction of the new taxiway Bravo is well advanced.

The Airport's conversion of the old Jota building into a multiple user training facility is progressing at pace. This remains a short-term solution to address the more strategic need for an Aviation Training College. Discussions continue with training providers to seek their interest in a long-term solution. The training facility is on target to open on 16<sup>th</sup> February.

The Airport is currently in discussions with the CAA regarding a new ACP for an IFR approach to 03 and further engagement with London City Airport and NATS has resulted in both parties being content with the Airport's proposal for the 21 RNAV overlay. The Airport will be submitting the Stage 3 Consultation Strategy and Full Options Appraisal documentation by July 2023, which is the new Gateway. Following consultation, according to the revised timeline, the CAA approval will be provided in January 2024, targeting the 04/2024 AIRAC, which will be effective in April 2024.
