I'm not personally a football fan, but I have to admit that I was actually impressed with the executive jet traffic arriving at Biggin Hill bringing in fans and teams on the 1st June.

I understand that the pre-booked in traffic was around 72 jets of varying sizes, and that was a massive planning exercise for the staff to ensure they could park them all, and of course, handle the passengers and crew. The airport effectively had three handling FBO locations, including the Airport's Training "Hub", which was set up as a temporary FBO location (for the first time I believe) for some of the smaller jets parked on the Southeast Apron.

So Biggin Hill literally became probably the busiest Corporate Jet airport since the setup to encourage that form of traffic to financially secure the airport's future. Very impressive!

But, as an aside, the airport literally stopped virtually all light aircraft operations over that weekend, at the very last minute, without pre-notification and planning for based owners and operators, causing much upset within the full time Biggin Hill based businesses. Whilst the airport had to operate on a positive safety basis of course, it was not a particularly professional way of enabling such organisations to pre-plan their operations in advance, rather than private owners and members booked to fly but unable to do anything even after setting up the aircraft's departure plans. The GA businesses totally lost the ability to operate and generate income to run their businesses over that weekend! Generally, this was not particularly well supportive of the businesses that are based at

the airport. In my opinion, forward notice, discussions, and planning with based operators should definitely have been carried by the airport.

As we were all made aware, our friend, Cobby, sadly died back in April, which was a shock to so many of us...

As you will all recall, Cobby's daughter, Mel Luck, very kindly notified us all of his sad passing on the Facebook Group, Biggin Hill Reunited, and let us know that it was her intention to arrange a gathering at Biggin Hill for his friends and family to get together to raise a glass or two in memory of our friend.

I have heard from any of you that the day was very special and attended by many of Cobby's friends.

As Mel advised us all that it goes without saying that Cobby wasn't a flower man, but if you wanted to make a donation in his honour, she would be making a donation to Macmillan Cancer Support in his name, which was as a thank you to the manager of his final care home, who was extremely supportive of her.

Keen to put his skills to the test and see if he still had the knack, Ray was delighted to return to the cockpit.

The team at Weald Heights and John Willis from Biggin Hill Reunited and the MP Flying Club organized for Ray to fly in a Grumman AA5B Tiger aircraft at Biggin Hill, where he was joined by John, who Ray had renewed his Instructors Rating 10 years ago.

Commenting on the experience, Ray said: "There's no better feeling than flying! During my time with the RAF, I took every opportunity I could to take to the skies, so I was incredibly excited to be back in the cockpit."

The visit was part of the home's Wishing Tree initiative, which encourages residents to put wishes forward, allowing them to reconnect with a past hobby or try something completely new – from flying on a plane to enjoying a fish and chip supper, no wish is too big or small.

Maria Covington, Home Manager at Weald Heights, said: "Ray absolutely loved his flying lessons, and is always sharing fond memories of his time in the sky, so when he told us he was interested in getting back in the cockpit, the team knew they had to make it happen.

JULY BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of July 2024 are:

£1:80.9 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre – and an additional 1p per litre off if also paid by Direct Debit)

£0:87.2 per litre for Jet A1 (Sustainable Aviation Fuel £1:10.7 per litre)

<u>SPECIAL NOTES:</u> Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards can no longer</u> be used at the self-refuel pumps. If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

June saw the Airport experience its business weekend in its history for business aviation movements. The weekend of the Champions League Final saw unprecedented demand and saw the Airport operate 3 FBOs simultaneously, utilising the training hub as a satellite FBO for the first time. The weekend was made more challenging given that the wind favoured runway 03, which required tactical flow coordination with NATS that impacted upon our PPR procedures. I am aware many in the GA community took heed of the Airport's safety notice issued on 17th May warning of disruption and elected to make alternative plans. The Airport's performance throughout the rest of June was as equally impressive.

The pressures of the industry remain, although we are starting to see schedule services predict movement levels more than pre COVID levels. The Business Aviation sector is starting to see similar strong performance. Notwithstanding this, the London market figures show the Airport's share marginally stabilising at around 21%, with Luton and Farnborough hovering around the 28% mark.

The Airport continues its development programme to improve existing infrastructure and improve its service offering to customers. The Airport is in discussing with key MRO providers to base their operations at the Airport in either existing hangars or new builds. The Airport has now completed the installation of the new Instrument Runway Visual Range (IRVR) system, which will eventually include 24-hour automated METAR reporting. The new IRVR system will need to undergo operational calibration prior to entering full operational use. Work also continues to plan for the runway resurfacing and introduction of centre line lighting in 2025.

Despite the focus on the forthcoming election, the launch of the Airport's Economic Footprint study has been extremely well received. The feedback has been extremely positive and the report has helped to reenforce the important role the Airport plays as a catalyst for inward investment, economic growth and job creation. The Airport site generates a GVA (gross value added) of £200 million to the UK economy and, importantly, £143m (70%) of this is captured within the London Borough of Bromley. Furthermore, the Airport is delighted to see it has been identified as a key area for economic growth in the draft Bromley Growth plan 2024 to 2027.

The continues to work alongside the CAA regarding the trial of the new instrument approach to Rwy 03. The CAA have confirmed the request constitutes a valid trial and is, therefore, both new and innovative. The CAA have acknowledged the Airport's objectives and outlined a phased approach to implement the trial. The Airport is now focused on obtaining IFP design approval and is still targeting to commence the trial by September this year.

As previously reported, the Airport continues to work hard to roll out the 2nd phase of its Air Quality Monitoring initiative with the installation of additional sensors. The monitors will have an increased number of sensors to detect SO2 (Sulphur Dioxide), NO2 (Nitrogen Dioxide), CO (Carbon Monoxide), VOC (Volatile Organic Compounds) and 03 (Ground Ozone). The sensors will also detect Particulate matter 1, 2.5 and 10 micrograms of solid or liquid particles in the atmosphere. The Airport will be working with the newly formed Airport Residents' Noise Action Forum to see how the Airport might report on Air Quality in the future.
