DAVID PARRY

Our friend and long term Biggin Hill'ite, (Dave) David Parry, sadly passed away on the 2nd June. He was born in Castle Donnington on 7th June 1945 but sadly didn't quite make it to age 80 by passing away just 6 days short.

Dave married his wife Jeannie in 1970 and they had 3 daughters, 2 granddaughters, and also one great-granddaughter.

In the early 1970's he started to take an interest in light-aircraft and later twin-engine aircraft. He obtained his Private Pilot license, and hence then moved to Biggin Hill in 1977, spending much of his time on the airfield! Their first home was in Challock Close, before moving to Sunningvale Avenue in 1986.

(He also got a Commercial Pilots License, although he never actually flew commercially, he just wanted to learn more.) He regularly flew friends and family for meals to places like Headcorn and Le Touquet and others.

In his working life, he was an electrician by trade, but he started that ability early by dismantling his family's electrical items to teach himself how to fix them. When he was 16 he worked in a TV and Radio Rental and Repair shop, and then shortly after formed his own business, panel beating, spraying and welding cars, in his lock-up garage in Plumstead.

He also bought damaged sport cars (for example: TR2, TR4, TR, and E-Type Jaguars) and rebuilt them back to perfection, often seeing these cars at car shows for decades later. So, his working life over all those years included being: a car mechanic, a panel beater and sprayer, a bus driver, an HGV class 1 and 2 driver, a driving instructor, a TV and video engineer, and finally, of course, an electrician.

His passion for motorbikes and cars continued throughout his entire life, and he owned his first motorbike at the age of 16 and continued riding them right into his late 70's.

Dave lived his life to the full, he was one of a kind, a real legend. He would say he had never worked a day in his life as he enjoyed it all, and when asked quite recently what more he wanted to do, he simply said, he'd done it all....

He passed away peacefully at home with his wife Jeannie, and his girls, daughter Tracey and granddaughter Leia by his side, with his favorite music channel on in the background.

Dave's funeral will be held in Bluebell Crematorium on Tuesday 15th July at 12.30pm, and afterwards at the Crown public house near the airport. BIGGIN HILL AIRPORT

The runway Resurfacing Project

Following the successful completion of the various deeper repairs stage, the airport is soon moving into the next phase of the runway resurfacing project.

The details of the project and timings is reported by David Winstanley below, so I am refraining from duplication the details in this section too.

The airport appreciates your continued patience and understanding as they complete this essential infrastructure project.

(My understand is that, once started, the runway resurfacing will be carried out at night, around a couple of hundred metres or so at a time, and then it should be then ready for use again at the morning's airport opening time. Once all done, I believe it is also the intention to have runway centreline lighting installed.)

As we have included in the last couple of newsletters, the construction of the new Bombardier Hangar, which is to be used as a major aircraft respraying facility, appears to be getting very close to completion. So, it looks as if it will soon be able to be used by them quite soon.

As previously mentioned, David's section explains the progress and testing of the new instrument approach on runway 03, which will be taking place soon to enable the introduction of the new formal approach procedure for inbound aircraft when runway 03 is in use.

(Once licenced, this new instrument procedure will avoid the necessity for aircraft, including quite large incoming jets, to do a relatively low circling manoeuvre around the airport to land on runway 03 after the initial instrument approach being made to 21, which has been taking place in recent times. This will obviously be a good thing for the local residents on the live circuit side.)

The airport appears to be now testing the new 24-hour automated METAR system, which is currently providing the weather before the ATC staff are on duty. That is of course seemingly then allowing the actual TAF to be generated long before the ATC is staffed. Until this became available, the METAR's only started to be available when staff were on duty, and that METAR information only then allowed the TAF's to start being issued after the second METAR has been published.

Bearing in mind that many aircraft arrive quite early having completed a long-distance flight, so it does mean that they will be able to review the likely Biggin weather even before the ATC is staffed....

Our Airport's CEO, David Winstanley, will include his regular monthly section, which is present towards the end of this newsletter, to keep us fully up to date with any airport plans that may affect us.....

JULY BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT and the Jet A1 price also excludes</u> <u>the Sustainable Aviation Fuel Levy</u>, for the calendar month of July 2025 are:

£1:68.10 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre – and an additional 1p per litre off if also paid by Direct Debit)

£0:80.90 per litre for Jet A1

(As we explained for a couple of months, the government has mandated that all JetA1 fuel be sold with a 2% blend of Sustainable Aviation Fuel. This mandate, which is applicable to all UK airports, is intended to secure and grow UK SAF demand, support the growth of the SAF industry, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions of aviation fuels in the UK.

Due to the additional cost of introducing more expensive SAF into JetA1 fuel, as dictated by this compulsory government initiative, the airport has introduced the SAF levy on JetA1 sales since the beginning of this year. To aid clarity and transparency, they have included this to be displayed as a separate line on the invoices.)

SPECIAL NOTES: Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards</u> **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps. If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

FALCON / EFG

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

June has ended on a high point in terms of both aircraft movements and the temperature! The Airport continues to make a strong start to the financial year despite the continuing uncertainty and escalation around Ukraine, Gaza, Iran and tariffs. The positive performance demonstrates the resilience of the Airport and the sector.

Developments across the site continue at pace with the steel works and outer cladding for the new Bombardier Paint facility almost complete. This state-of-the-art paint facility is the perfect example of the Airport's continuing drive to attract external investment, generate real economic value and create sustainable jobs. The runway resurfacing project is picking up pace following the successful completion of the deeper repairs stage, which allows the Airport to move into the next phase of our runway resurfacing project. The upcoming phase involves the asphalt resurfacing of the runway, which marks a significant milestone in the works. To keep fully up to date on these projects, please keep an eye on our social media channels: Facebook, LinkedIn and Instagram.

As previously mentioned, the Airport remains on track to achieve carbon neutral status by 2029 and we continue to build on the success of achieving our Carbon Reduction Level 2 Accreditation with the Airport Carbon Accreditation. Our newly formed Environmental Oversight Committee goes from strength to strength and the Airport is now looking at a concept to generate hydrogen on demand for protentional heating solutions.

The Airport has now successfully completed the final simulation run for the new London Biggin Hill RNP RWY 03 (Trial) and can now move full steam ahead for the live flight validation trials. These validation flights will take place in July/August subject to CAA approval of the validation plan. This is yet another significant step towards introducing the trial in Q3 of this year.

The Airport remains pleased with the engagement with the Private Pilots Group (PPG). The Airport is delighted that membership is flourishing and that engagement remains positive. This further demonstrates the Airport's continued commitment to the GA community.

As previously mentioned, the Airport is delighted with the continued success of the Airport Residents Noise Action Forum (ARNAF) in ensuring the Airport listens to the concerns of residents and, critically, brings together residents and the flying community. The work focused on the Keston NSA continues and I am grateful to the GA community for is support in this work.

Finally, congratulations to everyone who participated in our Sunrise Challenge on Sunday 22 June. The event saw over 400 runners (a record year!) take on the 5K run along our runway. It was a beautiful morning for our charity challenge; bringing together colleagues, local community members, and supporters to raise vital funds for our three charity partners: Aerobility, RAF Benevolent Fund and Scotty's Little Soldiers. Thank you to everyone involved in making the Sunrise Challenge happen and raising an incredible £9,500, which will be divided between the charities. A special shout-out to those colleagues, members of aviation community and friends who went above and beyond to help on the day.
