## AEROBILITY AND THE ARMCHAIR AIRSHOW 2021

Courtesy of Jon Windover, a founder of Aerobility, a few words about the charity and their recent unique online event:-

I write this to you still reeling from the success of yet another UK first from disabled aviation charity, Aerobility! The charity has pioneered a number of projects in the past, aiming to change lives through the magic of flight.

On Saturday (29<sup>th</sup> May), we delivered our most ambitious yet! We staged the first combined live and virtual air show, right here at Biggin Hill. A 3-hour aviation extravaganza was broadcast live from hangar 2 at the airport around the world. Exclusive interviews with notable aviators, insights into the world of display flying, and much more was put together by a big team made of Aerobility volunteers and Biggin Hill Airport staff. This was a non-public event, purely a live stream, allowing us to get our aviation fix, in spite of current restrictions.

None of this would have been possible without the support of David Winstanley and his team, and the belief in our project. Safe to say, the reviews have been tremendous! All this to raise money for Aerobility.

£100 funds a one hour flight to allow a disabled person to take to the air. So far, we've raised over £25,000, and the money is still coming in - so that's 250 disabled people who can take to the air. Or put another way, our fuel bill for 6 months! The event is over, but you can still support Aerobility if you wish, by going to our website and pledging as much or as little as you wish to help us get through these difficult times. ## UK ROADMAP – AN UPDATE

The UK Government's "Roadmap out of Lockdown" is now well and truly established and we entered Step 3 back on the 17<sup>th</sup> May as previously predicted.

So, apart from the ability for us to fly our light aircraft and for flight training to continue, many UK airlines and Tour Companies have restarted some flights for holidays in Europe, but with substantial restrictions in many Countries as a result of the UK Government's "traffic Light" system.

Indeed, additionally with the increased problems in the UK from the "Indian" variant (oops – can't say that can I...!) from "Strain B.1.617", many Countries are placing substantial restrictions on visitors from the UK being allowed into their Countries. (Maybe the UK should have been a bit more positive in controlling the people we allow into the UK, instead of just waffling with such terms as "guidance" until it becomes more serious issue in our Country.)

The UK Government is hesitantly still saying that the final planned step, which is scheduled to commence no earlier than 21<sup>st</sup> June, MAY still happen (subject to Covid numbers still remaining low and falling). If they do, then this is where the Government hopes to remove all legal limits on social contact, and reopen any remaining closed settings.

Let us hope we may still see a return to some form of normality. But I am not planning to hold my breath!!!!

# JUNE BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of June 2021 are:

£1:60.8 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted <u>using account card</u> Only from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 4p per litre)

£0:62.4 per litre for Jet A1

**SPECIAL NOTES:** Users should be aware that <u>credit and debit cards</u> **cannot** <u>currently be used</u> <u>at the self-refuel pumps.</u> The situation is likely to remain this way for some time, so if you use self-refuelling, please make sure you have your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there.

## MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

May has turned out to be an extremely challenging month with the projected recovery to 'normality' proceeding slower than we had hoped or expected. That said, our focus on operational readiness throughout April has proved beneficial, with manning levels and operational response times being where we would expect them to be. The limited number of countries that have been included in the red and amber travel categories remains frustrating, although we can all see that the demand for travel restrictions to be further lifted remains extremely high.

Movements levels throughout May have been somewhat erratic, with early May being very slow followed by occasional peaks and troughs and finally a very busy bank holiday weekend. Notwithstanding higher traffic movements over the bank holiday, trading remains challenging and the Airport continues to prudently manage costs whilst continuing to invest in infrastructure improvements.

We have constantly stressed the importance of continuing to invest in the Airport throughout COVID and highlighted the challenges of trying to restart projects once they are postponed or delayed. Furthermore, notwithstanding the challenges that appear to be emerging as a result of supply chain restrictions in a post BREXIT environment, the whole community can see clear investment into Airport facilities. With the new ILS fully operational and the announcement of early completion of the Bombardier hangar in December, we are delighted to have completed the resurfacing of Delta taxiway this month and commenced the resurfacing of Foxtrot. The Airport continues to work with the CAA regarding the 03 RNAV approach approval and progress the Air Space Change for the 21 RNAV overlay.

As the weather improves and restrictions are lifted further, we would like to remind all operators of the importance of adhering to our noise abatement procedures. We ask all operators to respect the Noise Sensitive Areas and ensure that, if safe to do so, you remain well clear of NSAs. The Airport remains committed to acting as a good neighbour and to do all it can to reduce noise impact on local residents.

It would be remiss of me not to address the Airport's proposal to amend its user clause to allow shared flights. We are disappointed that Bromley Council has rejected our request to allow shared flights at Biggin Hill on a limited basis. Shared flights are where small private/business aircraft allow individual paying passengers, on one-off flights, within the existing strict flight and noise limits. This is not scheduled holiday services such as Ryanair or EasyJet! Additionally, it would be remiss of me not to point out that we started to engage with officers from LBB back in October last year and we stressed that we wanted to explore all avenues to avoid a legal dispute.

As the largest employer in Bromley, we remain committed to working with the Council to ensure that local people can continue to benefit from new jobs and investment around the Airport. This is particularly important as we recover from the pandemic. I hope you all stay safe and well.
