ROSS HUMPHRIES

Old Biggin Hill'ite, Ross Humphries, has sadly died at the age of 80. He had been suffering for several years with a heart condition which gradually made physical activity more and more difficult. For the last couple of months, he was virtually housebound and, following a fall at home on 30 April, he was taken into hospital in Torquay, where he passed away on 13 May.

Ross had been named after a very young Canadian pilot, Ross Campbell, who had safely brought home his Bomber Command crew (including Ross's father, who was the navigator) following many raids in World War II.

So, with flying very much in his background, Ross joined Flairavia Flying Club in 1968, at the time when Trevor Prytherch was the CFI, with other instructors being David Quirk, Paul Shires, and 'Gruppenführer' John Marshall. He became close friends with Ian Frazer and Mike Markey and, having completed his PPL, he worked as a mechanic in Bill Webb's hangar and also for Express Aviation, until the early 1970s when a stroke of good fortune landed him the right-hand seat in the Whitbread Navajo Chieftain, captained by Fred Roffey (with whom, curiously, he shared the same birthday).

This was very much his 'dream job', and the following ten or so years were the happiest of his working life. Whitbread bought wines and spirits from all over Europe and Ross greatly enjoyed their regular flights to France, Germany, Holland, and Scotland. The Whitbread job also allowed him to accumulate the hours required to obtain his CPL - although, ironically, this was preceded by his obtaining a Senior Commercial Licence from Canada, whilst staying with friends in Alberta.

During these years he was married to Sharman but, after their divorce in 1985, Ross moved to Devon where, for a while, he worked out of Exeter Airport, flying the Royal Mail around the UK. In Devon, he was introduced to vivacious and spirited Fay; they married and had over 30 happy years together until her death in 2020. Fay encouraged him to travel, and they visited Canada, the Far East, and Australia, as well as many trips to Brittany and the Isle of Arran, where Fay still had family.

Whatever his latest interest might be, Ross made sure that he researched the subject so thoroughly that he became quite the expert, but motorcycles and history (particularly the Plantagenets) were abiding passions. He was a loyal, warm, kind man with a very quick wit and a great sense of humour. Everyone who knew him will remember a generous, charming and amusing companion.

He rightly earns a place on the Biggin Hill Reunited Roll of Honour.

Rest in peace, Ross. You will never be forgotten.

(I am grateful to Ian Frazer for contacting me with information about Ross. Ian was a true Biggin Hill'ite back in the 60s; he now lives in the Borders).

RAY WATSON'S SPECIAL DAY

What a totally amazing day Ray had on Friday 24th May - A Special Flight.....!

Ray Watson, one of the airport's favourite and most experienced Instructor/Examiners, and former member of the airport's SANARB Committee, was 91 on 7th February 2024.

Ray was a former RAF pilot and was once a full display pilot in various jet aircraft including the Hawker Hunters. (He was also the Head of the Valiant "V" bomber fleet for the Air Force!)

After subsequently leaving the RAF, Ray initially was the Captain of the main Instrument Approach calibration aircraft for the whole of the UK and Europe. After some time, he then became the Chief Flying Instructor and Examiner for Cabair, Biggin Hill, and subsequently for EFG, before ceasing operations for them last year for health reasons.

Ray's last flight was at the end of February 2023 when he flew with me to renew all my ratings etc. in my PA28-180. Whilst flying then, I asked him if he would actually like to fly himself - "yes please" he said. Whilst flying around in Kent, he just casually said that he hadn't flown for more than 18 months...!

In late 2023, because of some aging health issues, Ray was moved into a Care Home in Sevenoaks, where I (and several other airport people) visit him, in my case about every two weeks to keep him company and to remain in touch with the airport happenings since he ceased flying...

In early 2024, the Care Home asked me if I could take him flying, which of course I said I would love to do. I approached Peter Greenyer at Shipping & Airlines at Biggin (who also owns the MPFC club, where I now instruct following the closure of Alouette, where I was the Head of Training until the closure.) Peter very kindly agreed for me to do a special flight for him. I also approached the airport's CEO, David Winstanley, who kindly agreed to covering the landing fee and some additional costs, to help the care home to minimise their costs, for which I am so very grateful....

So, on 24th May 2024, the Care Home carers, and some of their residents, attended the Lookout Café and when there, I was able to surprise Ray by inviting him to come flying in the AA5, which we had parked outside on the ramp.

We had an amazing flight together which is so incredibly great to see him aviating again after so long since last flying. A wonderful, and most amazing person and pilot... It was a great flight for me to be airbourne again with Ray after all this time...

JUNE BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of June 2024 are:

£1:86.6 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre – and an additional 1p per litre off if also paid by Direct Debit)

£0:87.7 per litre for Jet A1 (Sustainable Aviation Fuel £1:11.2 per litre)

<u>SPECIAL NOTES:</u> Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards can no longer</u> be used at the <u>self-refuel pumps.</u> If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

BIGGIN HILL AIRPORT – A MAJOR LONDON CENTRE FOR CORPORATE AND GA OPS

Our airport has been showing excellent volumes of Corporate Jet's now operating into and out of Biggin. The success of the airport's encouragement of these corporate movements are going a long way to ensure that our airport is now pretty unlikely to ever suffer from closure at any time.

In addition to the corporate operations, the airport remains an excellent base for light aircraft training and private operations for us all..

I hope most of you will agree, and thank the airport owners and management team for keeping us all able to have a home at the special former RAF Battle of Britain airport... It is, and will hopefully always remain, a great airport for us all to operate from, and participate in our activities there....

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

May has turned out to be a busy month for the Airport with the Champions league final generating significant activity over this coming weekend. The Airport will be operating close to apron capacity and will be utilising taxiway Alpha to park some aircraft. This activity further cements a strong start to the financial year. The Airport continues to attract a range of new home-based business aviation customers and is seeing an increase in general aviation traffic.

Global instability, with the conflicts in both Ukraine and Israel, continue to have an adverse impact on the business and our industry. Notwithstanding this, the London market figures show the Airport's share marginally increased to just under 21%, with Luton at just under 29% ahead of Farnborough at just over 28%.

The Airport continues its development programme to improve existing infrastructure and improve its service offering to customers. Progress continues towards the introduction of an Aviation Technology College and the provision of onsite engineering accommodation. The Airport has now completed the installation of the new Instrument Runway Visual Range (IRVR) system, which will eventually include 24-hour automated METAR reporting. The new IRVR system will need to undergo operational calibration prior to entering full operational use.

The Airport has successfully launched its campaign to promote the results from its Economic Footprint study. The feedback has been extremely positive and the report has helped to reenforce the important role the Airport plays as a catalyst for inward investment, economic growth and job creation. The Airport site generates a GVA (gross value added) of £200 million to the UK economy and, importantly, £143m (70%) of this is captured within the London Borough of Bromley.

The Airport is pleased to announce that the CAA have provided an update regarding the Airport's submission to conduct an operational trial of the new instrument approach to Rwy 03. The CAA have confirmed the request constitutes a valid trial and is, therefore, both new and innovative. The CAA have acknowledged the Airport's objectives and outlined a phased approach to implement the trial. The Airport continues to work with the CAA to implement the trial by September this year.

As previously reported, the Airport continues to work hard to roll out the 2nd phase of its Air Quality Monitoring initiative with the installation of additional sensors. The monitors will have an increased number of sensors to detect SO2 (Sulphur Dioxide), NO2 (Nitrogen Dioxide), CO (Carbon Monoxide), VOC (Volatile Organic Compounds) and 03 (Ground Ozone). The sensors will also detect Particulate matter 1, 2.5 and 10 micrograms of solid or liquid particles in the atmosphere. The Airport will be working with the newly formed Airport Residents' Noise Action Forum to see how the Airport might report on Air Quality in the future.

Given this weekend will be extremely busy, the Airport would like to thank the Light general aviation community in anticipation of their patience and understanding.
