Sadly another old Biggin Hill'ite, Valerie Anand (who was Valerie Stubington back in the 60's), passed away on 13th January. She had apparently been ill for some time with lymphoma cancer and died at the Royal Trinity Hospice in London.

For those who were around in those early days, you may well remember her - Valerie was a member of Biggin Hill's Flairavia Flying Club, and she learnt to fly in about 1964 with instructors John George, David St Leger, David Quirk, and Trevor Prytherch.

Her friends, Anne Webb and Alan Walters, have made arrangements for Valerie's funeral at a location within the borough in which Valerie lived, London Road Cemetery Chapel, 59 Victoria Road, Mitcham, CR4 3JB on Friday 8th March 2024 at 2.00pm. Following the funeral, refreshments will be provided at the Toby Carvery 'Park Place', 54 Commonside West, Mitcham, CR4 4HB.

(Instead of funeral flowers, Valerie expressed a preference for donations to be made in her memory to either the Royal National Lifeboat Institution or the Royal Trinity Hospice, London.)

For most of us current Instructors and pilots operating at Biggin Hill Airport (and many others of course), have flown with Ray as the examiner to renew all our various licences.

NOT MUCH ADDITIONAL STUFF TO TALK ABOUT THIS MONTH

Being still the winter and having significantly poor flying conditions in recent months, which is actually not too surprising. Having said that, we have been discussing this winter's weather and it seems we all believe that conditions have been pretty much the worst we've had for several years.

The airport though has worked very well and had very good corporate jet aircraft movements justifying all the developments that the airport has carried out in recent years.

For Biggin Hill Airport regular flyers, please do ensure you have got a photo security pass by now, as most security gates to access airside require the passes to open them (the original gates with access codes have almost all now been replaced with card access instead). Please also ensure you are fully up to date with the details of Noise Sensitive Areas (NSA's) to be avoided, and also of course the Noise Abatement procedures to keep local residents on our side.

Users should also make sure you all have a personal login to the Biggin Hill Airport Centrik system to keep yourself fully up to date with safety issues and airport manuals and operational procedural changes etc...

Finally – after our comments in here last month, and at the Light Aircraft Steering Group February meeting, the airport's weather warning emails asking us to log in to view the warning in the

airport's Centrik system each time (often several times daily!) have now stopped. Thank you for understanding what we all felt about it.

MARCH BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of March 2024 are:

 \pm 1:83.5 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account</u> <u>card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

£0:93.2 per litre for Jet A1 (Sustainable Aviation Fuel £1.16.7 per litre)

SPECIAL NOTES: Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards</u> **can no longer** be used at the <u>self-refuel pumps</u>. If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

As I start this month's Airport update, I have been reminded that it is 5 years to the day I took up the post of CEO. I will avoid the temptation of what would appear as a self-indulgent reflection on our achievements but to simply say thank you to all the Airport community for their support over the past 5 years.

The Airport continues to enjoy a positive last quarter of this financial year as February has seen an increase in aircraft movements and associated income. This pick up in the Airport's performance is even more encouraging when you consider we are still dealing with the impact of both the Ukraine and Israel conflicts, rising costs, standard of living challenges and an uncertain economic outlook. Additionally, the Airport is bucking trends across Europe that has seen a 3% reduction in traffic when compared to the same period in 2023. France is the top European business aviation market this year, followed by the UK and Germany but all three markets less busy than last year.

The London market figures show the Airport's share has reduced very slightly, to just above 21%; however, to some extent, the figures mask the fragility in this matrix given a change of one or two landings a day has a disproportionate impact on monthly figures. Farnborough and Luton maintained their share of the market at just under 30% and just over 26% respectively.

The Airport has now finalised its Economic Footprint study and will shortly publish the headline figures, which remain extremely impressive. Direct employment has risen to 1,890 across the Airport site, generating a GVA (gross value added) £200 million across the UK. Critically, for every 1,000 air traffic movements a total of 88 full time jobs are supported.

The Airport continues to progress its submission for a full operational trial for the 03 RNAV approach. The trial plan will be submitted no later than the end of March. Trax Int. (the Airport's Airspace Change Consultant) have been working hard to keep the CAA engaged in the process to ensure a high possibility of the trial being approved.

As previously mentioned, the Airport is now entering the 2^{nd} phase of its Air Quality Monitoring initiative with the installation of additional sensors. The monitors will have an increased number of sensors to detect SO₂ (Sulphur Dioxide), NO₂ (Nitrogen Dioxide), C₀ (Carbon Monoxide), VOC (Volatile Organic Compounds) and 0₃ (Ground Ozone). The sensors will also detect Particulate matter 1, 2.5 and 10 micrograms of solid or liquid particles in the atmosphere. The Airport will be working with the newly formed Airport Residents' Noise Action Forum to see how the Airport might report on Air Quality in the future.
