AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT PROGRESS

The various Airport developments/improvements are still progressing very well......

The "Landings Hotel" is now looking very much more like an hotel and is expected to be completed in mid December, although not expected to actually open until the month of January.

The Battle of Britain special garden and memorial statue, designed by John Everiss, was formally opened on Friday 30th September with a very impressive and emotional series of wartime news films and speeches by both David Winstanley and Randolph Churchill to the large group of invited airport guests and local politicians, as well as several Wartime military veterans. Included within the formal opening was a flypass from the Heritage Hangar's Spitfire and then after the opening, the guests were taken to the Lookout Café for a light lunch and drinks, followed by a full Spitfire flying display over the airport for everyone's benefit.

A very special day and a unique garden and statue which is now open to the public to view at their leisure....

The Churchill Way roadway, along with street lighting and a pavement, is now totally completed right from the airport entrance by the roundabout through to the Heritage Hangar....

The vast new Bombardier Hangar and complex is now finished, and they have moved virtually all their services there from the original facility by the South Camp entrance. (That original Bombardier hangar has now been taken over by a new company, Jetex). Bombardier has also now retained the use of the other hangar, (formerly the Surrey and Kent, plus Cobby's, and Fairflight) but then used by Jet Aviation until Bombardier took it over.

The very popular Lookout Café is open and attracting many of the local residential population as was the case pre-Covid closure, and of course many airport employees who use it for their lunches.

The airport is certainly looking good and clearly is expected to remain in service as an airport long term, but still does support General Aviation activities and training where possible....

NOVEMBER BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of November 2022 are:

£2:13.8 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card</u> Only from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

£1:08 per litre for Jet A1

(or £1:53.1 per litre for "Sustainable Aviation Fuel"!)

<u>SPECIAL NOTES:</u> Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

ALOUETTE FLYING CLUB

Another month, another newsletter.

We were thrilled to host Ellie and Chris, our resident air traffic controllers, this month for a brief talk on the workings of ATC. They descended from their tower to join us at Alouette HQ to take us through both the process of becoming a controller, and the day-to-day process of stopping aeroplanes bumping into each other at Biggin Hill. I found it really interesting to note that, as pilots, we essentially think and do things in the same way as controllers, we just have a different view out the window. It was also useful for our students to find that those who work in ATC are not, in fact, four-headed ogres who like to eat the brains of low-houred PPLs, but they are human and they do occasionally make mistakes as well.

Being at the helm of a flying club with a history as long as Alouette's is in equal measure humbling and terrifying. Humbling because I feel little more than a custodian, and terrifying because, like any custodian, I want to leave it for the next person in a better condition than when I found it. But rather than being a tangible thing like a grandfather clock or a piece of ancient woodland, Alouette is more of a concept. The ideal is of a member-run social flying club with people coming and going and flights from sunrise to sunset and chats at the bar before going to sleep, smiling and exhausted, to do it all again the next day.

Alouette has been based at Biggin Hill since 1959 and I've heard all the stories; getting in early to put your name on the blackboard, sleeping under the wing of an aircraft, spending the entire day at the airfield then not being able to fly after all; I've heard about all the characters and all the tall tales of derring do and airmanship, good and bad; I've met airline captains on the other side of the world who learnt to fly at Alouette before I was even born.

For the past two years, since I inherited the role of chairman, I have been trying to cling to that ideal, that vision, that memory, and to keep a little flame from the past burning in our corner of Biggin Hill. And I have reached a sad yet unavoidable conclusion - nobody cares.

Rather like a child finding out the truth about the tooth fairy, I too feel a little silly in believing in it in the first place. I will not lament the instantaneous gratification we all desire these days, nor that the idea of burning oil and flying an aeroplane for fun these days is about as popular to today's youth as butchering a polar bear. I won't decry the fact that, even amongst those who do want to fly, very few can actually afford it, especially given the uncertain economic situation, and that for all the many benefits of flying at Biggin Hill, cost-saving is not one of them. The simple fact is, time passes.

We do get a trickle of people who, rather like those who sympathetically restore steam engines, see that alluring flicker of history in Alouette, but our flame is being starved of oxygen. The truth is that many of the big characters of the past have sadly now passed on or are at the very least long into retirement. Those who linger on are seemingly no longer interested in or able to get involved. Our next social evening, held since the days of Pluto and Aristotle on the first Wednesday of the month, will almost certainly draw in no more than four or five visitors, who will likely buy one or two soft drinks, discuss how much better things were in the past and then go home.

I and the band of merry men who are involved in the running of Alouette these days are fully committed to keeping it going, but a flame cannot burn without oxygen, and Alouette cannot continue without involvement and engagement from new blood. Without that I fear that a long-running and apparently much-loved Biggin Hill institution may soon be consigned to the pages of history, but I would really rather we could remain for another month and another newsletter.

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

The Airport continues to perform extremely well despite the fact that the economic landscape remains uncertain and the labour market remains extremely challenging. Staff recruitment and retention remains the Airport's most critical challenge. Against a backdrop of unprecedented levels of traffic, the need for continual investment in infrastructure puts pressure on the desire for prudent cost control.

The increase in business jet movements is as a result of several factors ranging from a move from scheduled to business aviation and other airports experiencing operational challenges. Notably, the Airport continues to see an increase in transatlantic traffic with a corresponding uplift in fuel revenue. Light aviation continues to mirror 2021, albeit with a slight reduction in movements, which might be a reflection that this market is more susceptible to the current economic environment. That said, the Airport has, at times, restricted PPR approvals to ensure safety and regulate demand. This more price sensitive sector may be affected by the economic challenges for some time to come.

Developments on the Airport continue to progress quickly and the Airport remains committed to keep this level of investment up to ensure we continue to improve our infrastructure. The operational transfer from Hangar 510 to Bombardiers 401 facility is now complete and Bombardier have, due to high demand, have chosen to maintain their operation in Hangar 446. The construction of the Hotel is progressing extremely well and practical completion is planned now for 22nd December. The Airport will complete operational work up trials over the Christmas break with a formal opening in January 2023. Recruitment across several areas is already underway and the Airport hopes to provide in excess of 20 full time jobs to local people. The Airport continues to engage with Mr Ecclestone regarding options for the development of West Camp. This remains an important strategic objective but will required detailed engagement with Heritage England and the LBB. The Airport has completed the road and footpath resurfacing from the roundabout to Wireless Way, leaving the area for the new Gatehouse and the cul-de-sac to Hangar 170, the only outstanding works to complete the overall project.

To address the immediate high demand for onsite training facilities, the Airport is converting the old JOTA building into a multi-user training facility. This is a short-term solution to address the more strategic need for an Aviation Training College. Discussions continue with training providers to seek their interest in a long-term solution.

The Airport remains extremely frustrated that it still awaits a decision from the CAA regarding the 03 ACP. The CAA confirmed that the Airport would receive a decision by late Q3 or early q4 this year. At the time of writing this newsletter update, the CEO awaits contact from the CAA.

Finally, the Airport wishes to express its thanks to the flying community for its continued adherence to our noise abatement procedures and for helping the Airport to remain a good neighbour.
