OCTOBER WEATHER

Well I guess it is reasonable to assume that Autumn has now become well established, and the weather last month has been significantly variable as it is to be expected. There have, of course, been quite a significant number of days this month that have been perfectly flyable for light aircraft flight training and touring. But unfortunately there have also been quite a bit of quite unstable conditions that have not been on the side of light aircraft visual flying.

As you read this Newsletter you will know the clocks went back last Sunday, so besides the likely wintery weather, the days will be significantly shorter now and this continues to reduce until it starts to reverse slowly from about the 22nd of December onwards.

But even knowing that, let's hope we get some nice weather some of the time to enable training and private flying to continue to be possible until we get to the Spring and the clock change again in late March...

STOP PRESS: Met Warning, which hopefully most members will be aware of, there are major storm warnings from the Met Office that are expected to affect us all in the South East area from late afternoon on Wednesday 1st November through to late on Friday. The warnings include very heavy rain and very strong winds, which are likely to affect all of us – good idea to tie down your aircraft or hangar it if possible to hopefully avoid damage if it is indeed severe.

STUART HOARE

Sadly on 4th October we lost another long term Biggin Hill'ite, John Stuart Hoare, known to all of us as Stuart Hoare.

He was a part of Biggin Hill Airport for many years commencing back in the early 60's (he even did own my first check out after I got my licence in tailwheels in a PA28 at Vendair Flying Club – the first modern nosewheel Piper at Biggin!)

Stuart was born and lived in Rawdon near Leeds and, as reported by his sister Val, he won the application for a flying scholarship at Yeadon Airport at the age of 16 (although the first his family knew about it was when it was actually announced on the tannoy at the airshow there!)

Stuart did his first solo not long after his 17th birthday (the youngest possible in those days of course). After gaining his PPL, he went on hour building and gaining a Commercial licence very quickly, and his first job was banner towing up there initially in a Percival Prentice that was owned by Cobby at Biggin.

Many of us oldies will remember Stuart appearing at Biggin in that aircraft doing the Lamtex Rugs banner towing as well as starting to fly as an instructor with a number of private owners at the airport in some modern exotic aircraft that started to appear in those days.

As many will remember of course, he married Janet, who was eventually a controller in the old tower on the South East apron for many years, after Stan Lee and I had left there.... Stuart and Janet eventually lived in a cottage at Emmetts National Trust property not far from Brasted and Ide Hill, before moving many years later in the mid-80's to Outwood in Surrey where they rented a cottage in the grounds of their old friends, Judi and Philip Wolf.

Stuart became a serious professional pilot operating many different aircraft types for organisations at Biggin and elsewhere that did air taxi flying and other corporate style operations. This flying was mostly in extremely modern (at the time) aircraft types like Cessna Golden Eagle's, and Beechcraft Travel Air's, Baron's, Queen Air's and later King Air's.

Sadly, as many of us knew, his wife Janet died suddenly in March 2014, which inevitably was a total shock to Stuart, who soon after moved over to a home near to Gatwick and eventually gave up flying after around 2009 following some medical issues that required the fitting of stents....

Val told me that for a while he apparently worked in a cycle repair shop in Horley to occupy his time. His retirement was spent happily helping all his wonderful neighbours with garden projects, house sitting and repairing motorcycles, cycles, lawn mowers, chain saws etc.

Stuart's funeral will take place at 3:30pm on 23rd November at the Surrey & Sussex Crematorium. Family flowers only please.

Sadly this year, in February, our old friend and Biggin Hill'ite, Mike Davies, passed away after a long illness. He was 85, but despite the challenges he faced with this, he never forgot his flying days at Biggin Hill Airfield.

Flying was a great passion in Mike's life. It was something he had wanted to do since he was in his teens, which was reinforced by his time doing military service in the RAF.

In the late 60's Mike learnt to fly at Biggin Hill, gaining his PPL and, in 1972, he bought his pride and joy, the Fournier RF-5 G-AZRK. He flew as much as he could all over the UK and

would make frequent weekend trips to France for baguettes, artichokes and brie, much to the surprise of customs. Mike loved nothing more than taking part in Breakfast Patrols.

When he wasn't flying his aircraft himself, Sportair Flying Club at Biggin (when I was the Chief Flying Instructor and examiner there) would use Mike's plane to teach their trainee pilots, some of whom will almost certainly remember his plane.

Mike was also a regular at Sportair Flying Club on a Friday night for the social get-togethers. He loved the social community there and made many good friends over the years. Some of those friends remained in his life until he was no longer able to keep in touch.

His name has been added to the BigginHillReunited Roll of Honour.

Airport security is tightening up largely because of the Airport's proximity to the capital city, and most airside access gates will require a pass to open them.

And do remember the importance of registering for the online Airport "Centrik" system to enable you to always be aware of what is happening operationally at the airport. If you haven't already done so, please do register yourself to keep up to date.

NOVEMBER BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, *excluding VAT*, for the calendar month of November 2023 are:

 \pm 1:90.7 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel</u> <u>account card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

£0:97.1 per litre for Jet A1 and Sustainable Aviation Fuel (while in stock...)

SPECIAL NOTES: Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards</u> **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps. If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

October was another challenging month for the Airport and, whilst movements were generally as expected, the traffic mix has seen a reduction in the long sector flights. This trend is being mirrored across the business aviation sector with movements 2.8% lower than this time last year but still 16.8% ahead of pre COVID levels. The Airport's share of the London market has stabilised around 23% just behind Luton and Farnborough but the Airport remains the 8th busiest business aviation airport in Europe. Light general aviation activity showed a reduction across all activities, with the exception of private owners, which has seen a slight increase when compared with October 2022. The current economic environment remains challenging and prudent cost control for any business remains the sensible course of action.

Notwithstanding the current economic challenges, the Airport continues to focus on its enduring strategy of the creation of a cluster of engineering and aviation related support companies engaged in the business and general aviation sector. This strategy was a key promise and purpose of our revision to the Airport opening hours in 2015/16, with the intention of attracting more inward investment and creating many more local jobs, so we are delighted with the successful progress of this strategy.

The Airport continues to attract significant interest in further infrastructure development across the site including enhanced aircraft completions facilities, additional hangarage, a dedicated skills academy, engineering accommodation and improvements to navigational aids. Aligned to this, the Airport continues to progress options for the re development of West Camp and plans have been developed to capture both Airport requirements and the potential to redevelop certain listed buildings within the old RAF camp. These plans will be developed in partnership with LBB and Heritage England.

The Airport has submitted a revised statement of need to the CAA to request a full operational trial of its preferred design for a new 03 approach. The CAA has accepted the request to amend the statement of need and an initial assessment meeting took place this month. If approved, the trial will be instrumental in facilitating the implementation of an instrument approach to runway 03.

The Airport has completed the consultation on the runway 21 approach airspace change that replicates what already happens to the north of the Airport but will use modern, more accurate satellite navigation as opposed to older ground based navigational equipment. The current timeline provides an approval date of 24th May 2024, following a 17-week decision period required by the CAA. This is targeted for completion by September.
