THE AIRPORT HOTEL

As anyone who has been to the airport in recent months will realise, the initial ground work for the construction of the new 56 room four star Boutique hotel at the Airport, to be named "The Landing", has now commenced.

The hotel, which will be owned and run by the airport, is due to be completed by November 2022, and will be managed by the recently appointed General Manager, Steven Thorne-Farrar who joins the hotel with many years' experience working in the hospitality industry, most recently holding the position of general manager of East Sussex National in Uckfield, an award-winning golf and spa hotel resort.

The Landing is primarily intended for flight crews who frequently fly in and out of the airport, as well as engineers and other employees of the numerous resident aerospace businesses based at the airport.

Another significant airport development, which will undoubtedly help to secure Biggin Hill's position as one of the main and most significant executive airports for London.

BOMBARDIER'S NEW HANGAR COMPLEX

Still on the subject of airport development, users will be able to see that the huge new Bombardier hangar complex in the centre of the airport is moving ever closer to completion, significantly ahead of the original planned completion date.

Another good sign for the long term future of London Biggin Hill Airport.

LOTS OF GENERAL IMPROVEMENTS

As commented by the CEO in last month's Newsletter, there are lots of general improvements being carried out around the airport, for example taxiway resurfacing and markings, and the airport is moving forward with an enhancement programme for Churchill Way.

Additionally of course, negotiations are continuing with the Regulator regarding gaining the approval for the already designed and submitted RNAV approach for runway 03, as well as working to affect an airspace change to allow an RNAV approach overlay for runway 21 to be added.

Finally, as required by the airport's lease, the 5 year review of the Noise Action Plan has been finalised and submitted. As stated last month, the final version of this plan is available for viewing on the Airport's website, for those that are interested

All these general improvements and actions will continue to enhance the airport's standing as "THE" Executive Airport for London. It has certainly come a very long way since the 60's when I was a controller here.

OCTOBER BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, excluding VAT, for the calendar month of October 2021 are:

£1:69.8 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account</u> card <u>Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

NOTE the increased discount that will apply from 1st September

£0:68.8 per litre for Jet A1 (or £1:13.5 per litre for "Sustainable Aviation Fuel"!)

<u>SPECIAL NOTES:</u> Users are advised that <u>credit and debit cards **can no longer** be used at the self-refuel pumps.</u> If you use self-refuelling, you will need your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (if you haven't got one with you, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers instead).

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

In the 'blink of an eye' we appear to have lurched from one crisis, the COVID pandemic, straight into another crisis, the creation of a fuel crisis that would appear to be of 'our' own making. I suspect many of you have been affected by the queues at petrol stations, whether you needed fuel or not and, whilst this has not affected the supply of Jet A1 or Avgas, the timing could not have been worse. I had hoped my opening remarks would have been full of recovery, growth and optimism, so I will endeavour to paint a more positive picture.

The reality, in terms of the industry, is that there is a case for being cautiously optimistic as we have seen a very buoyant August followed by a very buoyant September. Traffic levels have been higher than 2019, albeit still predominately in the lighter classification of aircraft types. Nonetheless, the mood music from the Air Charter Expo suggests that the changes in travel behaviour are here to stay and that bodes well for the Business Aviation sector.

Investment in infrastructure and facilities continues at pace and we remain on track to bring the Bombardier Hangar development in on time and on budget. As promised, you can all see that construction has started on the Hotel and I am aware that our newly appointed General Manager of the Landing Hotel has already started to engage with key partners regarding their requirements. Discussions continue regarding the construction of additional hangers and the Airport has now approved the works to enhance Churchill way. Finally, the Airport continues to work with the CAA regarding the 03 RNAV approach approval and the progression of the Air Space Change for the 21 RNAV overlay.

In the last newsletter update, I advised the airport community that the Airport had recently completed its 5-year review of the Noise Action Plan as part of its commitment within the Deed of Variation to increase operating hours in 2016. I am pleased to advise that the Airport is now working on implementing the recommendations within the review and I will looking to the Airport Community for your continued support.

Finally, the Airport continues to engage with the London Borough of Bromley and I would like to reiterate, as one of the largest employers in Bromley, we remain committed to working with the Council to ensure that local people can continue to benefit from new jobs and investment around the Airport.

I hope you all stay safe and well.
