RALPH SCOTT

On 23rd August Biggin Hill Airport sadly lost one of the nicest of the old school aviators, Ralph Scott.

Ralph, who would have been 94 at the end of August this year, was one of the the owners and the MD of the very successful Express Aviation Services (who occupied the hangar opposite the self-refuelling point that is now RAS Aviation) for many years. Express was a main Piper Dealer, and they ran one of Biggin Hill's best and most reliable aircraft maintenance operations.

Starting outside aviation, he was, with Bob King, one of the two owners of Lec Refrigeration Services in South-East London, that covered servicing and support over most of London and the South East of the UK for the manufacturer Lec, who were based in Bognor.

Ralph subsequently followed his ambition, and learnt to fly at Surrey and Kent Flying Club in it's heyday. (in those days I was a controller at Biggin, and Ralph would spend many days sitting in the Tower while I was on duty watching and learning from all that was going on at the airport – Ralph and I became, and remained, great friends until the end.)

After gaining his PPL, Ralph bought a beautiful Piper Comanche, the fastest of the original Piper complex single engine aircraft. He flew it regularly with his young family all around the UK and Europe.

Following on from that he subsequently flew extensively in a Twin Comanche, and along with another old Biggin Hill'ite, Stanley Ingram, they flew it across Europe and through Africa to South Africa, and return. In those days an amazing trip...

Eventually, following the death of Ray Hawkins, who owned Aviation Communications (AvCom) with Tom Cummings, in the same hangar, Ralph, along with Bob King, John Richardson, and Nick Lilley, took over the operation and dealerships and renamed it Express Aviation. The

business expanded quite dramatically and maintained many busy Charter and Commuter operation's aircraft (including my own Chieftain, Cessna 310's, and Embraer Bandeirante's). Ralph eventually sold the business when he retired in around 1985.

Ralph then moved to live for some years in Spain until relatively recent times, whilst his UK home remained in Chislehurst when he was in the UK.

Sadly Ralph's wife, Madelaine, died around 6 weeks ago after a spell in hospital, and clearly it had a very marked effect on Ralph's health. Whilst being quite frail, which is not unexpected when someone is in their 90's, Ralph was still in quite good humour and loved nothing more than reminiscing about the early days at Biggin Hill and about the many wonderful people he had met. I personally spent quite a lot of time with him in the last couple of months endeavouring to cheer him up and get him remembering all those flying types from the early days.

His health deteriorated quite rapidly towards the end and he was admitted into hospital on the morning of the 18th August, where he sadly passed away in the evening of 23rd August with his surviving family all present at his bedside.

A total and absolute gentleman, loved and well respected by almost all who ever met him. Ralph will be missed by us all

R.I.P. Ralph – forever in my mind – your many friends will never forget you....

Ralph's name has, of course, been added to the Biggin Hill Reunited Roll of Honour....

UK COVID RECOVERY AND TESTING

The UK Government's "Roadmap out of Lockdown" seems to change every five minutes depending on what individual politicians and Government Ministers want to do for themselves, rather than what is actually going on with Covid.

Our Government seems to be using pretty much everything in their power to make foreign holidays virtually impossible by virtue of costs and restrictions. It couldn't possibly be an attempt to make everyone spend their money in the UK rather than abroad would it??

In addition to that, here in the UK the required Covid testing regime for travel seems to change by the day, and always be far more restrictive than virtually every other Country around the World – and most certainly, the UK's costs for Covid testing associated with foreign travel is certainly amongst the most costly in the world.... It really is time the UK Government took the reins properly and only appointed and approved test providers who can give the required service at a maximum price dictated by Government that doesn't make the UK look a bit of a joke.... (many countries charge as little as £10 or £20 or equivalent for a simple Rapid Flow "Antigen" test, and even £30 to £40 for a PCR. Compare that to the UK where many "approved" providers charge anything up to £80 or £90 for an Antigen test, and up to £300 or £400 in some extreme cases for a PCR test!).

I realise this may be considered a bit of a personal rant! It is! But someone has to start telling our quite lax politicians what sort of things need a more sensible and practical approach, without encouraging the population to just start to rebel and ignore Westminster...

Whilst I'm being critical, I do actually think our Government has basically done quite well to control the pandemic, but they do need to be more proactive in rectifying matters such as testing costs via any Government approved providers than they have done in the past. If the providers don't like it, then they should lose their approval.

OK – rant over..... (I'd run out of things to write this month, so it seemed worth doing this. Hope I haven't upset too many people!)

SEPTEMBER BIGGIN HILL POSTED FUEL PRICES

The "posted" Biggin Hill Airport fuel prices, <u>excluding VAT</u>, for the calendar month of September 2021 are:

£1:68.3 per litre for 100LL Avgas if supplied from the Fuel Bowser (if uplifted using <u>fuel account card Only</u> from the Self-Refuel pumps = minus 5p per litre)

NOTE the increased discount that will apply from 1st September

£0:65.8 per litre for Jet A1 (or £1.08 per litre for "Sustainable Aviation Fuel"!)

<u>self-refuel pumps.</u> This situation would appear to be permanent now, so if you use self-refuelling, please make sure you have your airport H-TEC fuel account card with you when you go there. (or else, you will have to go over to the Main Terminal apron to uplift fuel from the bowsers).

MONTHLY NEWS FROM THE CEO's OFFICE

With the complete lifting of restrictions and the return of mass public events, I would have hoped to start this newsletter update in the belief that we can say COVID is behind us; however, the increase in infections and isolation occurrences suggest otherwise. The lifting of travel restrictions and the increase in the number of countries on the green list does give rise to greater optimism although continued vigilance remains the order of the day.

We have seen a steady increase in traffic movements over the past few months and August looks like another record month. Again, the limited return of US and long-haul traffic have meant that traffic is predominantly in the lower weight categories and therefore the economic challenges remain.

Investment in infrastructure and facilities continues despite some supply chain challenges arising from BREXIT and the shortage of HVG drivers. The Bombardier hangar remains on target for an early completion in December of this year. With the completion of the construction contract for the Hotel, the community should see visible construction starting in the next few weeks, with completion planned for late 2022. Discussions continue regarding the construction of additional hangers and the Airport is in the final stages of approving the works to enhance Churchill way. Finally, the Airport continues to work with the CAA regarding the 03 RNAV approach approval and the progression of the Air Space Change for the 21 RNAV overlay.

In the last newsletter update, I advised the airport community that the Airport had recently completed its 5-year review of the Noise Action Plan as part of its commitment within the Deed of Variation to increase operating hours in 2016. I am pleased to advise everyone that the engagement with the key stakeholders of the SANARB, BHACC Noise and Safety Sub

Committee, the BHACC and LBB is now complete and that the review was finalised this month. The final version is posted on the Airport's website.

Finally, the Airport continues to engage with the London Borough of Bromley and I would like to reiterate, as one of the largest employers in Bromley, we remain committed to working with the Council to ensure that local people can continue to benefit from new jobs and investment around the Airport.

I hope you all stay safe and well.
